2024 SIDEWALK REPAIR PROGRAM- DISTRICT 11

The City of Mount Clemens sidewalk repair program was established in 2017 by the City Commission. This program was developed to repair hazardous sidewalks within the public right of way throughout the city. The sidewalk program established ten districts, along with a downtown district, to equally divide sidewalk lengths. To date, districts 1 through 10 have been completed. In the spring of 2024, the sidewalk program will continue in district 11 (see map). Each property owner is responsible for the repair of hazardous sidewalks located adjacent to their property as outlined in City of Mount Clemens Ordinance 10.100- Sidewalks City of Mount Clemens, Michigan.

Below is a list of important dates that you should keep in mind if you own property within district 11:

- On or about 1/22/2024 the city forwarded notices to all affected property owners by US Mail. This notice outlined the two options available to property owners for the replacement of sidewalks. Please carefully review the letter you received - it will explain the benefits and requirements of the two options.
- On or around 3/6/2024 the city's engineering firm, AEW, will begin marking sidewalks. The target date for completion of marking is 3/20/2024.
- 4/17/2024 is the tentative start date for sidewalk repairs by the city's licensed contractor. 6/28/2024 is the expected construction completion date by the City's licensed contractor.
- Property owners can prepay the amount due for their sidewalks and receive a 10% discount on the same. The prepayment window is April 1, 2024 through June 23, 2024. <u>After April 1st</u>, owners may contact the City Treasurer's office at (586) 469-6800 ext. 2 to determine the amount due.
- If a property owner does not pay during the prepayment window of 4/1/2024 through 6/23/2024, they will receive an invoice for the completed work in the beginning of August.

access channel. Go to **mountclemens.gov/salenotice** and enter the information for your sale. The earlier you make your request, the longer your sale notice will run on the message board. At least two weeks' notice is recommended.

STATE PRIMARY ELECTION IS TUESDAY, AUGUST 6, 2024

The next election in the city of Mount Clemens is the state primary election on Tuesday, August 6, 2024. Voting precincts will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

Please call the city clerk's office at 586.469.6800, option #4 for questions about the election.

THREE WAYS TO VOTE

As a Michigan voter, you have options on how you may cast your ballot:

- 1. **Absentee Voting** Sign up to be on our new Permanent Absentee Ballot list and you will automatically be sent a **ballot** for every election—no more applications are needed.
- 2. **Early In-Person Voting** For every federal and state election, Mount Clemens voters may come to Mount Clemens City Hall and cast their ballot in person beginning the second Saturday before the election and ending the Sunday before the election for nine consecutive days of early voting. Early voting hours are 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. daily during this nine day period.
- 3. **In-Person Voting at Precinct on Election Day** Vote in person at your voting precinct from 7:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

HOLIDAY REFUSE CALENDAR



Good Friday - Friday, March 29, 2024

Garbage pickup will be on schedule during the entire month of March and April.

Memorial Day – Monday, May 27, 2024

There will be NO garbage pickup on Monday, May 27th. Pickup will run one day behind schedule for the entire week beginning Monday, May 27th through Friday, May 31st. Regular garbage pickup will resume on Monday, June 3, 2024.

Independence Day – Thursday, July 4, 2024

There will be NO garbage pickup on Thursday, July 4th. Pickup will run one day behind schedule beginning Thursday, July 4th through Friday, July 5th. Garbage pickup for Monday, July 1st, and Tuesday, July 2nd, and Wednesday July 3rd will be picked up *on schedule*.

YARD WASTE PICKUP IS SCHEDULED TO BEGIN MARCH 25, 2024

A special yard waste collection truck will operate in the City from March 25th through December 6th only.

NO COMPOST OR YARD WASTE WILL BE PICKED UP AFTER DECEMBER 6, 2024.

BEGINNING MARCH 25th, please do one of the three following things to eliminate yard waste:

- 1. COMPOST YOUR YARD WASTE AT HOME.
- PLACE ALL COMPOST AT THE CURB IN A 32 GALLON OR SMALLER REFUSE CONTAINER MARKED "COMPOST" OR "YARD WASTE". THESE CONTAINERS WILL NOT BE EMPTIED IF THEY CONTAIN ANYTHING OTHER THAN YARD WASTE.
- PLACE YARD WASTE IN LARGE 30-GALLON BROWN PAPER BAGS.

Compost must be placed at the curb for collection with your household refuse by 7 a.m. on your regular pickup day. Yard waste in plastic bags will not be collected. Brush must be cut into four feet lengths and tied in bundles. Bundles must not weigh more than 50 pounds each or measure over 18" in diameter. Large logs over 3" in diameter, as well as stumps or roots, will not be picked up.

We recommend that residents comply with the City's composting guidelines to help us with our efforts in keeping up with constantly changing environmental standards and still provide efficient and economical refuse collection service within the City of Mount Clemens.

PLEASE REMEMBER, RAKING LEAVES OR GRASS INTO THE STREET IN THE CITY OF MOUNT CLEMENS IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED.

MOUNT CLEMENS FIRE DEPARTMENT

A MESSAGE FROM FIRE CHIEF REYNOLDS

I wanted to take a moment to share with you some important safety tips that will help keep you and your family safe in 2024.

As we enter the Spring months a few things will no doubt come to everyone's mind: those dreaded Spring-Cleaning chores, and perhaps even worse...the "Springing" forward of our clocks. I cannot help you with either of those, but I can remind you that this is also the ideal time to check your Smoke Detectors and Carbon Monoxide Detectors. NFPA statistics clearly demonstrate that over 60% of home fire fatalities occur where no detectors are present or are not working, and Carbon Monoxide can present serious risk at any time throughout the year.

Early detection is paramount and will help your family stay safe. To protect yourself, your loved ones, and your property, you must have working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in your home. These inexpensive devices quickly work to alert occupants of danger and dramatically reduce the likelihood of injury/fatality during home fires and/or Carbon Monoxide incidents. Please be sure you have them installed and that they work. A detector without batteries,



SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms.
 When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month.
 Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multi-sensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

FACTS

- ① A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.



UNDERSTANDING THE NUMBERS

¹An absorption rate between 15.4% and 18.3% is considered a market in balance. Higher favors sellers, lower favors buyers..

Consumers appear to have adjusted to rates where they are, using adjustable-rate mortgages as a short-term measure, expecting to refinance should lower rates appear. While rates remain volatile, purchasing now vs. a year from now will only see buyers paying more for homes.

Understanding the numbers:

Average Sale Price - Okay: While averages are lower in Q4 2023, this is most likely based on the mix of homes sold, and the motivation of the seller. If an investor, for example, as rates increased in Q4, they sold inventory to lock in profits. Furthermore, on a market of rising rates, investors are more flexible when negotiating than owners who need the equity to purchase a new place to live.

Days on Market (DOM) - Healthy: A DOM of under 30 days indicates there is strong buyer interest, but there is also some opportunity for buyers not to be rushed.

Inventory – Neutral: Up quarter over quarter, down year over year. More is better, with declining interest rates sales should increase.

Absorption Rate - Seller's market: Buyers need to remain aggressive when they find a home they really want. An absorption rate at these levels means the market is very competitive from a buyer's perspective.
